Welcome!

On behalf of Lock Haven University, the Lock Haven Department of Criminal Justice, and the Pennsylvania Association of Criminal Justice Educators, I **welcome** you to the **30th Annual Meeting of the Pennsylvania Association of Criminal Justice Educators**. In our local communities, communities that have for too long taken the most costly approach to punishment, justice reinvestment initiatives are saving money through programs that are smart (opposed to tough) on crime. At the local level, justice reinvestment includes programs like; crisis intervention training, pre-trial supervision, specialty courts, reentry programming, day reporting, supportive housing, and other culturally competent correctional programs and practices that enhance system outcomes (typically measured as recidivism) while not putting the public at increased risk of victimization from crime. To that end, I am extremely pleased to have the architects of Clinton County's justice reinvestment initiatives (not all of them but a good cross-section) as invited guest panelists. It is my hope that they will share their experiences about the difficulties and successes of implementing justice reinvestment programs in rural Pennsylvania.

Thank you to the members, students, and supporters of PACJE for their continued support for the organization and this conference. Special thank you and appreciation to our dean, **Dr. Stephen P. Neun**, who provided unwavering support (and enthusiasm) for the conference and to the **faculty in Criminal Justice Department** for supporting this year's conference.

Thank you for joining us today at Lock Haven University and it is my hope that you will all have an enjoyable and productive day at the **2018 PACJE Annual Meeting**.

I am extremely pleased to moderate a panel discussion with our **invited guests** for the 30th Annual Pennsylvania Association of Criminal Justice Educators luncheon. While this format is a departure from past plenary speakers, I thought it appropriate to invite a panel of speakers to talk about justice reinvestment. Ultimately, justice reinvestment is not the responsibility of a single entity, individual or institution rather justice reinvestment programs are “built from a breadth of input”, effective planning, and systematic implementation. Ultimately, justice reinvestment involves a combination of stakeholders working toward common goals and building on efforts to address challenges related to correctional costs, supervision, and recidivism. To that end, I am very pleased to introduce the

individuals who have been key to the success of Clinton County's Justice Reinvestment efforts.

- **Jeff Snyder, Clinton County Commissioner:** I cannot imagine how a community could consider justice reinvestment initiatives without support from its governing officials. Jeff Snyder has been serving as Clinton County Commissioner since 2012 and has been a consistent (and at times skeptical) advocate for justice reinvestment. Like other members of the panel, Commissioner Snyder has roots in Lock Haven (and Lock Haven University) having graduated from LHUP in 1998 (B.S. in Elementary Education). He was also the owner and operator of Chatham Run Feed Mill for 33 years before entering politics.
- **Michael F. Salisbury, Judge Clinton County Court of Common Pleas:** What do you do when you need a judge to administer your newly implemented specialty court? You obviously ask a judge who was the former county prosecutor! After serving Clinton County as the Assistant and District Attorney for 16 years, Michael Salisbury was elected Judge of the Clinton County Court of Common Pleas in 2013. Shortly thereafter, Clinton County implemented its first specialty court program and, well the rest is history. Currently, Judge Salisbury presides over the Treatment and Veterans' Court. He is a graduate of Lock Haven High School, Juniata College (1979), and Widner School of Law (1982).
- **Shea Madden, Executive Director of the West Branch Drug & Alcohol Abuse Commission:** Shea Madden has been working with various treatment courts since 1998 and is (and has) served in the capacity of Executive Director of West Branch Drug and Alcohol Abuse Commission since 2003. She earned her B.A. degree in Sociology from Pennsylvania State University and has played a critical role in implementing the Treatment Court and coordinating treatment (generally) for justice involved populations in Clinton and Lycoming Counties.
- **Regina Shawley, Case Manager, Clinton County Correctional Facility:** Regina Shawley was hired as the Case Manager at Clinton County Correctional Facility in 2015. At the time, the correctional facility was undergoing re-organization and expansion of correctional treatment and case management services (related to justice reinvestment). In her role as Case Manager, Regina is responsible for local offenders, reentry planning, and case management services. She also has ties to Lock Haven University having graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Psychology (2009). Finally, Regina also earned her Masters of Science Degree in Psychology from the University of Phoenix.
- **Dave Goodwin, Specialty Courts Coordinator, Clinton County Adult Probation Services:** In terms of justice reinvestment, the proof (that it works) is in the numbers. Savings are the result of offender diversions from incarceration into community supervision options. For the past few years, Dave Goodwin has been responsible for monitoring offender diversions in Clinton County. Beginning in January 2017, when he was promoted to the Specialty Courts Coordinator, Dave has kept track of client participation in; Treatment Court, Veterans Court, Day Reporting, Medicated Assisted Treatment Program, Bail Supervision, Domestic Violence Fast Track Program, and the Mental Health Diversion Program. I am also happy to report that Dave was a criminal justice major at Lock Haven University.

Northwestern Pennsylvania

Southwestern Pennsylvania

Southcentral Pennsylvania

Southeastern Pennsylvania

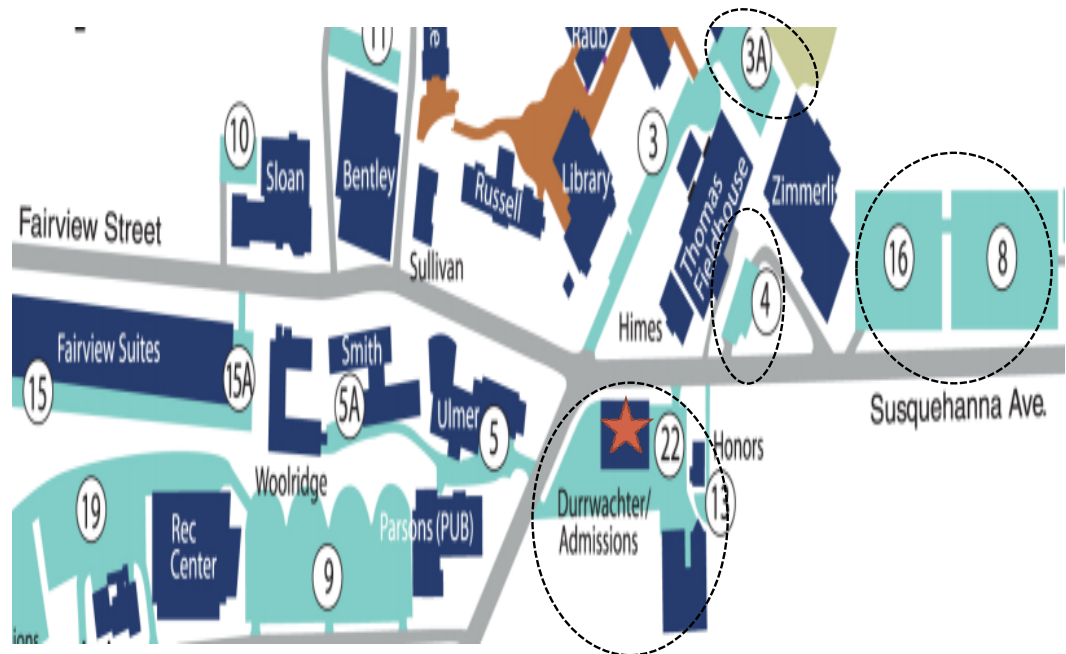
